Stockholm Loves Pollinators!

Honeybees, solitary bees, hoverflies, beetles, butterflies and moths – they all play a vital role in the pollination of agricultural crops and native wildflowers. But pollinator numbers are in dramatic decline worldwide.

Stockholm Loves Pollinators is a grassroots project run by Bin i Stan together with the British Embassy, English Church, Forbundet for Ekoparken and Vetenskapens Hus and is supported by the ADS. Together, the organisations have a vision to see best pollinator practice adopted as policy across Stockholm city.

Sweden does not yet have a national pollinator strategy (unlike the UK, for example) and Stockholm lags behind other cities like Oslo, Amsterdam and Lyons that have a co-ordinated approach that supports the needs of pollinators.

So, Stockholm Loves Pollinators is working to establish a joined-up approach to pollinator conservation, so that a 'pollinator perspective' becomes part of every land-management decision made across the city.

And diplomats in Stockholm are playing their part

With the help of Stockholm Loves Pollinators, embassies have been landscaping their grounds with pollinator-friendly flowers and trees.

In 2018, members of the ADS planted an urban wildflower meadow in the heart of Diplomatstaden. For 2019, another site will be planted, where the support of the Diplomatic community will play an important part.

Meanwhile, here are 7 Simple Steps you can take to help pollinators:

- 1. Plant a variety of pollinator-friendly plants and trees to provide forage all year round.
- 2. Do not cut your grass so often or so low.
- 3. Leave some grass areas to grow wild.
- 4. Do not use pesticides.
- 5. Put up insect hotels and herbal flowerbeds or "insect restaurants".
- 6. Leave fallen branches, deadwood and piles of leaves on the ground.
- 7. Keep sandbanks and bare earth areas for the 70% of pollinators who live in the ground.

Welcome to Stockholm

Welcome to Stockholm – one of the most beautiful capitals in the world. Built on 14 islands around one of Europe's largest and best preserved medieval city centres, the Swedish capital is superbly positioned, with stunning and extremely varied scenery in every direction.







Districts

Each of Stockholm's six inner-city districts has its own charm and characteristic atmosphere. All of the districts are very attractive living areas with public transport close at hand. Here follows a brief tour through the various districts.

City/Norrmalm

City/Norrmalm are really only areas for business and shops. Few people live in the area compared to the other districts of the city. The most eye-catching street life in City and Norrmalm is centred around Drottninggatan, Kungsgatan and Hötorget. Drottninggatan's many small shops and large department stores guarantee an almost endless shopping spree. At Hötorget vegetable and flower vendors gather to haggle prices for the day's fresh goods, which are often very favourable to customers.





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Djurgården

Djurgården is Sweden's most beloved amusement and recreation area. It includes more than 20 of Stockholm's finest attractions with entertainment, museums, restaurants and outdoor activities. The most famous attractions are Skansen – the first open-air museum in the world, Gröna Lunds Tivoli – an amusement park, Vasa Museum – the bestpreserved 17th century ship in the world, and Junibacken – an interactive storybook building where children young and old can travel through the world of author Astrid Lindgren.

Vasastan

Vasastan is a lively neighbourhood with charming architecture and many trendy pubs. This is a hot neighbourhood for careerists and celebrities to set up in business. Vasaparken is a popular place for boule players, picnicers and families to get together and relax in during the summer. Vasastan offers some interesting sights as The City Library (Stadsbiblioteket), The Observatory (Observatorielunden) and Gustav Vasa Church. The Strindberg Museum is also located here. This is where the Swedish author August Strindberg spent the last four years of his life.

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Kungsholmen

Take a walk along the waterline that surrounds this district, the views are breathtaking. You can see wonderful buildings, stroll through beautiful parks and, of course, you must visit one of Stockholm's most important landmarks, The City Hall (Stadshuset). Don't forget to explore the areas around the central part of Fridhemsplan, Kungsholmstorg and all of its small streets and alleys. Kungsholmen offers a diverse choice of shopping venues, from Västermalmsgallerian to smaller specialist shops along Hantverksgatan.

Södermalm

Södermalm is known as Stockholm's most bohemian area. Here you can find the good bits of everything that is not mainstream when it comes to restaurants and shopping. The whole length of Götgatan is renowned for its large number of pubs. Medborgarplatsen is another place full of life in the summer, with lots of outdoor cafés and restaurants, the market hall and movie theatres that encircle the square make it folksy and festive. Here is where everyone gathers to enjoy the warm summer evenings.

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Östermalm

Östermalm is a district in Stockholm's inner city. This neigbourhood is associated with exclusive apartments, luxury hotels, high end fashion and a vibrant nightlife. And a wonderful area to stroll around in.

Östermalm is often described as the city's most fashionable district with an abundance of large luxury apartments, the most exclusive of which are found along Strandvägen. Take a walk there and soak in the atmosphere and enjoy the magnificent buildings and wonderful seaside views.

Bibliotekstan is the city's most affluent shopping district, with exclusive Scandinavian and inter-

national brands. This is located around Birger Jarlsgatan, Smålandsgatan, Jakobsgatan and Norrlandsgatan. Here you will find fashion brands such as Chanel, Louis Vuitton, Prada, Gucci, Burberry, Stella McCartney, Ralph Lauren, Michael Kors, Nathalie Schuterman etc.

If you'd like to go malling, there is Sturegallerian on Stureplan and Fältöversten on Karlaplan, both with lots av shoppong and eating alternatives.

Östermalm is also the host of luxury restaurants and also has the highest concentration of nightclubs in the city, found around Stureplan.

There is a great concept at the Eataly on Biblioteksgatan. Two floors for you to explore as you eat, shop, and learn all about the best food and drink from Italy!

One of the city's oldest and most beautiful market halls, Östermalms Saluhall, is located on Östermalmstorg – in the heart of this district. It is a lovely food hall from 1888, with counters packed with the finest of cuisine. There are also several restaurants and cafés where you can enjoy traditional Swedish delicacies. At the moment the food hall is being renovated and the original star-shaped floor plan recreated. Until the beginning of 2020, you can visit the temporary hall located on the Östermalmstorg square.

The Royal Dramatic Theatre further contribute to the area's fashionable status. It was founded in 1788

and commonly known as Dramaten. This beautiful white art noveau-building at Nybroplan has been the theatre's home since 1908. In the repertoar you'll find classical theatre, newly written Swedish and international theatre, and theatre for children and youth.

Swedens most internationally renown cultural personality, Ingmar Bergman, grew up here on Östermalm. First on Villagatan 22 and then Storgatan 3. He was and still is generally considered to be one of the leading directors in film history.

Ingmar Bergmans Plats and Ingmar Bergmans Gata, the square and street named in his honor, are both located just behind the Royal Dramatic Theatre.

Among museums in the neighborhood you'll find The Swedish History Museum, The Army Museum and The Nationalmuseum.



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The Old Town

The Old Town (Gamla Stan) is one of the largest and best preserved medieval city centres in Europe, and one of the foremost attractions in Stockholm. This is where Stockholm was founded in 1252.

All of the Old Town and the adjacent island of Riddarholmen are like a living pedestrian-friendly museum full of sights, attractions, restaurants, cafés, bars and places to shop. Gamla Stan is also popular with aficionados of handicrafts, curios and souvenirs. The narrow winding cobblestone streets, with their buildings in so many different shades of gold, give the Old Town its unique character. Even





now cellar vaults and frescoes from the Middle Ages can be found behind the visible facades, and on snowy winter days the district feels like something from a story book.

There are several beautiful churches and museums in the Old Town, including Sweden's national cathedral Stockholm Cathedral and the Nobel Museum.

The largest of the attractions in the district is The Royal Palace, one of the largest palaces in the world with over 600 rooms. In addition to the reception rooms, there are several interesting museums in the palace, including the Royal Armoury, with royal costumes and armour. Don't miss the parade of soldiers and the daily changing of the guard.

Västerlånggatan and Österlånggatan are the district's main streets. The city wall that once surrounded the city ran inside these streets along what

is now Prästgatan. In the middle of the Old Town is Stortorget, the oldest square in Stockholm. Stortorget is the central point from which runs Köpmangatan, the oldest street in Stockholm, which was mentioned as early as the fourteenth century.

Mårten Trotzigs gränd (Mårten Trotzigs alley) is hard to find. It's the narrowest alley in the Old Town, only 90 centimetres wide at its narrowest point. Make sure not to miss Riddarholmen and the Riddarholmen Church. The church is a royal burial church, and was built as a Franciscan monastery for the so-called Grey Brother monks in the thirteenth century.

To know before moving to Sweden

As diverse as Sweden is, there are a few societal norms that are distinctly Swedish – some quite basic, others more subtle. Understanding a handful of them will hopefully prepare you culturally before moving to Sweden. When you're invited home to a Swede, you'd better be on time and take your shoes off...

Swedes love their coffee

Few people drink more coffee than the Swedes. In Sweden, coffee drinking is fostered through a tradition called fika – in which friends, family or colleagues meet for coffee or tea, often with something sweet on the side. Most Swedes will enjoy at least one fika a day as an opportunity to bond.

Get in line

From the pharmacy and tax office to your local grocery store's meat counter, you'll be forced to exercise patience as you wait to be served in a numbered queue. Many businesses have a ticketing system – usually a small hard-to-find machine hung on a wall that dispenses number notes. Once you grab your ticket, you'll have to wait until your number shows up on a screen before you can proceed to the counter.

Speaking Swedish helps (no, really?)

Chances are you can live here for years without learning a lick of Swedish. Swedes are widely rated as world number two at English as a second language. Therefore it might take you longer to learn Swedish, and the Catch-22 is that fluency in the language is crucial to full integration. Signing up for SFI (Swedish for immigrants) could be a step in the right direction. Learning swedish might be a challenge, but worth the effort. SFI courses are offered through each local municipality's adult continuing education program (kommunal vuxenutbildning, or komvux) so you will need to contact your local municipality.



Get your shopping done before 17:00, if you can

Many stores close early, especially at weekends. You'll be hard-pressed to find a store open past ten in the evening that isn't a petrol station. It's worth keeping in mind that since many Swedes are done with their regular jobs around five it's likely that you'll be battling crowds to get your shopping done between five and half past six.

You will squeeze food out of toothpaste tubes

To prepare you for your first visit to the cold foods section of a grocery store, understand that in Sweden, tubes are also used to package foods such as caviar, mayonnaise, mustard, and other similar condiments. At some point, you'll probably squeeze some caviar from a tube onto half a boiled egg for breakfast.

Frippe, Dramatens Bakficka, is the restaurant where theater visitors, actors as well as you and I meet in a genuine bistro feeling for a wonderful dinner with friends and family, a cocktail or an afterwork with colleagues. The menu offers clean, classic flavors packaged in a modern and unexpected way. The open kitchen characters stand in beautiful contrast to the well-thought-out dining room table setting and gives the feeling of classical Swedish style bistro.

At Frippe you can also socialize in the middle of an exhibition, where food culture and art meet. Here you find the legendary Swedish photographer Hans Gedda's exhibition in French bistro hanging. Even here the classic meets the new and modern as Margaretha Krook and Andy Warhol meet Junior Brielle and Silvana Imam!

You will see fathers pushing prams

When it comes to equality between the sexes, Sweden is one of the leaders, and the men definitely pull their own weight in staying home and raising infant children. In Sweden, couples are entitled to 480 days of paid parental leave, and this time can be shared between parents.

Locate your nearest IKEA

There are very few stores in Sweden where you can buy affordable furniture and food at the same time, so it's definitely worthwhile locating your nearest IKEA. Many IKEA stores offer free bus services from central locations to the store and back.

Many businesses shut down in July

It's not uncommon to find restaurants and stores shut down for an entire month, usually in July, while employees take their four to six weeks of holiday.

Lagom

There is a societal code of conduct in Sweden which really has no direct translation. Loosely translated, the word lagom means 'just enough,' in moderation,' 'appropriate' and other synonyms you can pull out of the dictionary. When used in reference to societal behaviour, it means blending in appropriately without extreme displays of emotion.

Melodifestivalen – not so lagom

Melodifestivalen – the national event through which Sweden's representative at the Eurovision Song Contest is decided – unites large parts of the population. Held every February through March, it is a particularly welcome distraction on long dark winter nights. Come May, the Eurovision Song Contest is just as popular – though some Swedes prefer the ice hockey world championships, which usually coincide with the international music event.

Swedes are an outdoorsy bunch

Okay, maybe not all of them. But many. In Sweden, all year round there's at least one activity that can be enjoyed, come rain, shine, or winter blizzard. And the government has made it easy to enjoy Sweden's nature by giving people the Right of Public Access, Allemansrätten.

Winters are cold and dark

It's no secret that Sweden's geographical location makes it prone to cold, dark winters. At the depth of winter in some northern parts of the country above the Arctic Circle, you might get as little as three hours of sunlight per day. So, winters may be rough, but you'll be rewarded during summer. Long hours of daylight and moderately warm temperatures make Sweden one of the most beautiful places to be in during May to August.

Take off your shoes!

You'll quickly notice that shoes are taken off when entering private residences in Sweden. Some explain it with the simple fact that Swedes spend a lot of time outdoors during winter and are prone to dragging in dirt. Others say it's a sign of respect for the home. Either way, you might want to think twice before wearing full lace-up boots when visiting folks.

Be on time

It is common knowledge here that 'time' should be respected at all times – regardless of whether you're going for an interview or a friendly fika. Meetings will start on time with or without you. The train leaves on time with or without you. Swedes value punctuality.

The state-owned alcohol monopoly

While you can purchase alcoholic drinks in restaurants and bars, if you'd like to take a sip from the bottle in the privacy of your own home, you've got only one legal option of buying stronger alcohol, and that's from one of the roughly 400 state-run liquor stores (Systembolaget).

Special days celebrating food

Sure, Swedes celebrate Christmas, Easter, Midsummer and Walpurgis Eve. But almost as important are the days celebrating foods: Shrove Tuesday (Fettisdagen), which in Sweden calls for a semla; Waffle Day (Våffeldagen) on 25 March; and Cinnamon Bun Day (Kanelbullens dag) on 4 October. Feel free to gorge on said food all day long without guilt.

Keep that plastic bag

Think twice before you toss out that plastic bag. Most Swedish grocery stores charge you for plastic or paper bags in an effort to keep waste low and encourage recycling. Swedes like to keep it sustainable.

Business casual means jeans

General everyday fashion in Sweden is simple, relaxed and casual. This same concept has seamlessly seeped its way into more formal business settings. Unless your colleague is meeting foreign clients or attending a high stakes board meeting, chances are they are wearing jeans and a long-sleeved shirt.

It is safe to drink the water

Drinking straight from the tap is the norm in Sweden. The water is clean and fresh, so you can save both money and the environment by not buying bottled water.

Not all education and healthcare is free

While the Swedish healthcare system is largely taxpayer-funded, it's not entirely free. For routine doctor's office visits, the maximum amount you may have to pay out of pocket for an entire year is SEK 1,100.

Universities in Sweden are free for citizens of the EU/EEA or Switzerland. Since 2011, students from other countries are charged for studying at Swedish universities. The universities set their own fees, which mostly vary between SEK 80,000 and 140,000 per academic year. Read more about studying in Sweden at studyinsweden.se Useful links

Holidays & traditions

Swedes have many holiday celebrations throughout the year. Most public holidays begin their celebrations a day early – on the "eve". As this day is considered as a Saturday, banks, offices etc. are closed and shops in town close earlier than usual. Shops are not required to stay closed on public holidays and opening times are decided by the shop owner. Public holidays are called "red days", röda dagar.

Nyårsdagen-New Years Day

January 1st is a public holiday and December 31st is treated as a Saturday.

Trettondag jul-Epiphany

January 6th. Many offices are closed on the 5th of January or at least close early. January 6th is a public holiday. This is the last time julbord (Christmas "smörgåsbord") will be served. It is also the day to remove all Christmas decorations and throw out the Christmas tree.



Vasaloppet-Vasa ski race

Ist Sunday in March. An international ski marathon from Sälen to Mora (85km). This is reputedly the biggest cross-country ski race in the world. The first Vasa ski race was arranged in 1922. The route is the same as King Gustav Vasa took in 1521 while being pursued by the Danes.

Påsk-Easter

Falls between March 22nd and April 25th. Långfredagen - Good Friday. Påskdagen - Easter Sunday. Annandag Påsk - Easter Monday. Shops and offices close early on Thursday. Friday, Sunday and Monday are public holidays. The word påsk originates from both Italian and Greek vocabulary meaning Passover. In 1325 Nicosia decided Easter would fall on the first Sunday after the first full moon after vårdagjämningen (vernal equinox). This is on March 21st, therefore Easter falls between March 22nd and April 25th. Over the Easter period you will observe many different traditions which are unique to Sweden.

Valborgsmässoafton-Walpurgisnight

April 30th. People welcome the onset of spring by lightning huge bonfires. Traditionally, witches were believed to have travelled on brooms or goats to old sacrificial settings. People in villages would light fires to scare off the evil doers. Students wear their white caps and sing traditional songs followed by a night of dancing. Shops and offices often close early.

Första Maj-May day

May 1st. Holiday of the working classes and traditionally a day of protest marches. Shops and offices are closed.

Kristi Himmelfärdsdag-Ascension day

The 40th day after Easter. Always occurs on a Thursday and is a public holiday. Many offices and public authorities will also be closed the following Friday.

Pingst-Whitsun

10 days after Ascension day. Pingsafton - Whitsun eve. Pingstdagen - Whitsun day. Pingstdagen is a public holiday.

Sveriges nationaldag-Sweden's national day

June 6th, a public holiday. Parades, flags etc. are commonplace on this day. On June 6th 1523 Gustav Vasa ascended the throne and united the Swedish nation.

Midommar-Midsummer

Saturday between June 20th and June 26th. Midsummer Day is a public holiday, and Midsummer's Eve is treated like a Saturday. Midsummer is celebrated during the weekend around the longest day of the year. It was originally celebrated to welcome the arrival of summer in anticipation of a fruitful harvest. According to folklore, it was believed that Midsummer Eve was a night of magic and supernatural occurrences. Family and friends gather and enjoy the traditional meal of matjesill (pickled herring), gräddfil (sourcream), gräslök (chives), and new potatoes accompanied by Swedish "snaps". You can also see people dancing around the flower covered maypoles (which incidentally were considered to be an old viking fertility symbol) while singing folk songs.

Kräfskiva-Crayfish Party

Middle of August. A strong tradition amongst Swedes are crayfish parties held during the middle of August. People gather to eat boiled crayfish, drink Swedish snaps and sing lots of drinking songs.

Surströmmingskiva-Fermented Herring Party

End of August. Another summertime tradition is fermented raw herring from the north of Sweden. It is famous for its incredibly potent smell and therefore enjoyed by a select few only. The premiere for this day is on the third Thursday of August and in fact, in the north of Sweden they often substitute crayfish parties for this sour, salted herring from the Baltic Sea. If you are brave enough to sample surströmming, then it should be eaten in accompanient with crisp bread (tunnbröd), almond shaped potatoes (mandelpotatis), raw onion, sourcream, and washed down with beer, snaps or milk.

Alla helgons dag-All Saints day

Saturday between October 31st and November 6th. Some offices close on the Friday before All Saints Day. Saturday is a public holiday. Families light candles and place flowers and wreaths on the graves of loved ones.

Mårten Gås-St. Martins Day

November 11th. This is to mark the end of autumn work and start of winter activities. It is celebrated mainly in the south of Sweden where goose is eaten on this day.

Advent-Advent

The 4 Sundays before Christmas. The traditional time of year to begin decorating for Christmas, lightning Advent Candles and opening Advent Calendars. Also the time to eat julbord (Christmas smörgåsbord dinner).



Nobeldagen-Nobel Day

December 10th. The date of Alfred Nobel's death. On this day the Nobel prizes are awarded in a grand ceremony and banquet which is shown live on TV.

Lucia-Saint Lucia Day

December 13th. Lucia is not a public holiday. According to folk tradition this is the longest night of the year and marks the beginning of the Christmas season. St. Lucia is the patron saint of light and was supposedly introduced to West Sweden by Irish missionaries in the 9th century. Celebrations began in the late 18th century when young girls, wearing white clothing and crowns of candles in their hair, would serve coffee and buns to the master and mistress of the house. Nowadays, a young girl dressed in white and with a crown of lighted candles on her head parades while singing special songs, along with a procession of "young lords and ladies in waiting", also dressed in white.

Julafton-Christmas Eve

December 24th. Juldagen - Christmas Day. Annandag Jul - Boxing Day. Christmas is celebrated on Julafton. December 25th and 26th are public holidays.

Christmas buffet

The buffet is made of delicacies that are carefully prepared to celebrate the feast. Breaded ham with dip in a pot is usually the main dish, but it is accompanied by many other delicacies, ranging from game, fish and vegetarian. The herring table is a must! The prestigious restaurants showcase new innovative flavors of herring every year. The Swedish spiced snaps, a kind of spirits, are also an accompaniment to the Christmas buffet.

New Year's dinner

A New Year's dinner in Sweden is a classy meal – A Sylvester Supper. A Sylvester Supper is served with

high quality meat or a gratinated lobster. The desserts are made to match the glittering guests. At midnight everyone are drinking champagne!

Easter dinner

On the traditional Easter dinner lamb and salmon are served as main course. For starters there are pickled herring and egg halves with different toppings set in rows to small delicious delights. The dessert table also plays an important role of the celebration.

Restaurants that offer Easter dinner: Grand Hôtel, Ulla Winbladh, Långbro Värdshus.

Midsummer lunch

Midsummer is a big family holiday when our delicious salmon plays the main role, together with the traditional herring table. The meal ends with strawberries with whipped cream and a dance around the Maypole.

Restaurants that offer Midsummer delights: Skansen, Ulla Winbladh, Grand Hôtel,

Crayfish & Surströmming Party

The autumn starts with a crayfish or a surströmming party, outdoors among friends, family and moon lanterns. The Swedish people sucks in everything from the dill-cocked crayfishes or make clamps of flatbread, potatoes, onions and the long-awaited salted and fermented herring, that is called surströmming. Beer and snaps are served to these specialties. Before you drink snaps you sing different songs to celebrate the special spirit - a very old Swedish tradition in the darkness of the autumn. Skål!

"Crayfish require these drinks!" This phrase was coined by one of our most famous Swedish author Albert Engström!

Restaurants that offer craufish and surströmming: Sturehof, Tennstopet, Ulla Winbladh.

Mårten Gås dinner

A very old tradition from the south of Sweden to celebrate the Mare Goose. One special menu is black soup made of goose blood as a starter, a roast goose with plum stuffing, served with cream sauce and apple chutney. And a classic dessert Spettekaka!

Top design places in Stockholm and central Sweden

Looking for places to explore Swedish design, arts and crafts during your stay in Sweden? Svensk Form (the Swedish Society of Crafts and Design) has put together this list of the top design places to visit in Stockholm and central Sweden.

A Pile of Art in Kumla

A Pile of Art is exactly what the name indicates. Beautifully located on a hill, this sculpture park showcases some thirty sculptures with widespread forest, meadow and lakes as backdrops. Rising 100 meters above the plains outside the town of Kumla, the Kvarntorp Pile is hard to miss. The manmade hill consists of ash remains from the shale oil recovery that took place here 1940–1966. It might sound like an unlikely place for art – nonetheless, this is one of Sweden's most outstanding sculpture areas. Every year a new work is added to the 30 that are already spread out atop the pile.

Gustavsberg Contemporary Craft Art

Sweden's leading gallery for contemporary craft art is an innovative meeting point with exploratory exhibitions. The gallery is located in Gustavsberg, a small coastal town outside of Stockholm. The exhibition schedule features crafts in all types of materials, displaying current work by internationally recognized craft artists as well as the avant-garde of the younger generation. There is an extensive Shop & Showroom where you can purchase Swedish contemporary crafts of art.

The Home of Carl And Karin Larsson in Dalarna

The artist couple Carl and Karin Larsson decorated their home Lilla Hyttnäs with a personal take on arts and crafts. Immortalized in the watercolor paintings by Carl Larsson, the artistic power couple's light, colorful style has had an iconic impact on Swedish interior design and family life since the late 19th century. Lilla Hyttnäs is located in the idyllic village Sundborn in Dalarna.

Nationalmuseum

After five years of re-construction, The New Nationalmuseum at Blasieholmen opened again in October 2018. Nationalmuseum is Sweden's national museum of art and design, with great collections that contain paintings, sculptures, drawings and prints from 1500-1900, and applied arts, design and portraits from the early Middle Ages up until present day. Other than exceptional art, don't miss the museum restaurant which has been called Sweden's most designed restaurant. It is decorated and furnished with works by some of Sweden's leading designers. More than 80 products have in fact been designed especially for the restaurant, such as the chandeliers, vases, lamps, porcelain and larger items like furniture, bar counters and wall décor. However, the restaurant does not only offer outstanding design - it is led by Fredrik Eriksson, one of Sweden's top chefs, who serves delicious food created with Swedish gastronomic craft methods.

Woodland Cemetary

A cemetery might not be on the top of the list when you travel, but Skogskyrkogården (the Woodland Cemetery) in Stockholm offers a unique architecture experience and is a Unesco World Heritage site. Besides being a large green oasis, buildings such as the Chapel and Crematorium are designed by renowned Swedish architects Gunnar Asplund (1885-1940) and Sigurd Lewerentz (1885-1975) after winning an architect competition in 1915. Details such as the pattern in the limestone floor inside the Holy Cross Chapel is for mourners to rest their eyes on during grief, and a glass wall can be lowered into the floor after the funeral so that the congregation can step right into the living landscape after the ceremony. Gunnar Asplund was famous for his typical Nordic Classicism and functionalist style - for other examples visit Stockholm Public Library, which is one of his most famous works

ArkDes in Skeppsholmen

With a heritage going back to the 1950s, Sweden's national centre for architecture and design, ArkDes, is a museum, a study centre and an arena for debate that shares premises with Moderna Museet on Skeppsholmen in Stockholm. Aside from the exhibitions do not miss the library, which boasts great glass windows and an appealing functionalist interior. Staying true to Scandinavian values of inclusion and accessibility, the centre also arranges seminars and conferences around themes such as the future of the city and exhibitions often highlight young design talent. Spanish architect Rafael Moneo has designed the award-winning buildings at ArkDes, which include two exhibitions halls, library, office and café.

Ground Meat

Ground meat recipes are a favourite – it's inexpensive, cooks up fast and can be used in many ways, like meatballs, hamburgers, chili, lasagna, soup as in the image below... We've selected a few favourites for you to try at home. Enjoy your meal!



Bo La Lot

Fragrantly seasoned rolls of ground meat wrapped up in cha plu leaves are a favorite Vietnamese snack that's great with cold beer or white wine.

Ingredients (18 rolls) 600g ground beef 300g ground pork 2 tablespoons sriracha sauce 2½ tablespoons ABC sauce (Kechap Manis) 1.5g kaffir lime leaves 8g red chili 9g coriander root 10g garlic 15g salt 1 dl scallions 6 stalks lemongrass 18 cha plu leaves Oil for frying

For serving:

Fresh coriander and chopped scallions to sprinkle on top. Sweet chili sauce for dipping.

Step by step:

Shred kaffir lime leaves and chop all vegetables. Mix kaffir lime leaves, chili, coriander root, garlic, the sauces and salt in a blender, to a smooth paste. Combine the paste with the meat and blend thoroughly. Then stir down the finely chopped scallions and lemongrass.

Shape 10 cm long sausages, about 50g each, and roll them into cha plu leaves. Fry in a pan until they get a nice color. Also perfect for grilling.

Ragù Alla Bolognese Della Nonna Adria

The genuine ragù alla bolognese is a slowly cooked sauce, and its preparation involves several techniques, including sweating, sautéing and braising. Preparation 15 minutes, cooking time 2 hrs.

Ingredients (4 servings) 2 tablespoons, olive oil 1 onion, finely chopped 1 celery stick, finely chopped 1 carrot, finely chopped 1 tablespoon, conserved tomatoes 250g, beef mince 3-6 inches, rosemary, leaves picked and finely chopped 3-6 inches, thyme, leaves picked and finely chopped White wine (alternatively water) Salt and pepper

Step by step:

Heat up the olive oil in a heavy-based saucepan. Add the onion, celery and carrot and stir. Cook over a medium-low temperature with a lid over the pan for 5-10 minutes, or until the vegetables starts to become translucent. Stir every couple of minutes until vegetables are softening with the edges adapting a golden brown color.

Add the beef mince and stir it into small pieces using a wooden spoon. Increase the heat to mediumhigh. Keep stirring and let it cook for about 10 minutes or until the color of the beef changes with its juices oozing out and starting to fry.

Add the tomato purée whilst stirring and let it boil for a minute. Keep stirring and add the white wine and 120 ml/4 fl oz water, alternatively, leave out the wine and add an additional 250ml/8 fl oz water.

Season with rosemary, thyme, salt and pepper to your preferred taste and turn the heat down to low. Cover the pan with the lid and let it boil over a very low temperature for 1 hour, add 120ml/4 fl oz of water when the sauce is starting to dry out. The beef should almost be covered with liquid during the first hour of cooking.

Serve the ragu with a type of pasta such as fusilloni, pappardelle or paccheri that will give you just the right amount of sauce with every bite. Boil your pasta to be served al dente, keeping its texture to remain firm in every bite throughout the meal.

Patty Melt

A patty melt is a type of sandwich consisting of a hamburger patty, topped with cheddar cheese between two slices of bread. It is a cross between a grilled cheese and a hamburger.

Ingredients (2 servings) 320g ground beef 4 slices of white bread 8 slices of cheddar cheese Salt & ground black pepper

Step by step:

On medium heat toast the breadslices on both sides. On high heat put a ball of grund beef (160grams) in the middle of the pan and let it sizzle for a few seconds. Take a spatula and press the ball of meat

When the juices of the meat start to surface its time to flip the meat. On the cooked side now

to a meatpatty about the size of the breadslices.

season with salt and black pepper. Take the meat out of the pan when it is cooked to your liking, and let it rest.

Drag two slices of cheddar across the fryingpan to preheat them and place them on one of the breadslices. Repeat and put cheese on the other breadslice.

Take the rested meat and put it on one of the breadslices with cheese on. Take the other slice of bread with cheese on it, and place it on top of the meat (cheeseside facing the meat). Put the whole patty melt back in the pan to let the cheese melt further, flip it once to heat both sides evenly.

Place the patty melt on a cuttingboard and cut it diagonally from corner to corner.

Gotland – the Island of hidden beaches and lime stone dreams!

A trip to Sweden's biggest Island is a must for every visitor in the northern hemisphere. Gotland offers a picturesque mediaeval town, 800 km coast line and divine food cooked by highly skilled chefs that uses locally produced groceries.

The Island of Gotland is situated in the Baltic sea, about 90 km (56 miles) off the Swedish coast. Gotland also includes smaller islands around the main island such as Fårö, Gotska Sandön and the Karlsö Islands (Lilla and Stora Karlsö). The biggest city on Gotland is Visby (around 25.000 inhabitants/ the whole island has around 60.000 inhabitants), since 1995 it has been on the UNESCO World Heritage site list. The Island is formed from a sequence of sedimentary rocks of a Silurian age and Gotland is called the Island of lime due to its famous limestone composition and its sea stacks, known as "Rauks". On specific places there are spectacular fields of sea stacks that are free for guests to visit.


How to get to Gotland

It's possible to travel to Gotland with your own boat, along the coast there are several harbours. The easiest way to access the island is by ferry or plane. The ferry line Destination Gotland operates between Visby and mainland ports in Nynäshamn and Oskarshamn (in the summer time there's also a connection to Västervik). The journey with the ferry takes around 3 hours and onboard the ships there are cafés, restaurants and all the services needed for a comfortable crossing. In the spring 2019 a new ship, M/S Visborg, was launched. The ferry takes up to 1650 passengers (plus 500 cars) and runs on LNG (Liquefied Natural Gas) that reduces CO2 emissions with around 20%. There are daily flights from both Bromma and Arlanda to Visby, Gotland's main city. The trip takes around 35 minutes and are operated with both SAS and Braflyg.

Once on Gotland the roads and nature are excellent for both driving and bicycling. The Island is open for everyone and the countryside offers a great variety of gems, for example, farm shops, small restaurants and bars, nature reserves and mediaeval churches. There are several bike and car rentals on the Island for travellers that arrived without their own transport. For a weekend in Visby a good pair of shoes it's all that's needed.



When to go

High season: mid-June to mid-August.

Necessary to pre book travel tickets and accommodation. A lot of Swedish visitors visit the Island during their vacation. Beaches, restaurants and Visby welcome a great amount of holiday seekers.

Shoulder season: May to mid-June & mid-August to mid-September.

In a lot of peoples opinion, the best time to visit Gotland. The weather is often very good, accommodation and restaurants are open, and the nice climate is perfect for outdoor activities.

Low season: October to May.

Is the Island Sweden's best hide away? In Visby restaurants and hotels are open and on weekends many small cafés, art studios and farm stays are open. The stunning nature is always open and free to visit. In December, there are Christmas markets in Visby and Easter is a great event celebrated all over the island.

Top 3 things to do in Visby

1. Visit the Town Wall and old church ruins

A walk in Visby is a stroll back in time. The Town Wall, one of the best preserved in Europe, was first built to keep the farmers out of the city. The Wall is nearly 4 km long and 27 of its original 29 towers are well preserved. Inside the Town Wall, there are 10 old church ruins dating back to the beginning of the 13th century. One medieval church is still in use; Visby Cathedral (S.t Maria Domkyrka).

2. Eat and drink Gotlandic style

In Visby many restaurants have an internationally good reputation and several of them are mentioned in the White Guide. Chef's use locally produced groceries and cook meals with the special Gotlandic touch. In the summertime the whole city of Visby feels like a cosy outdoor restaurant, some places are situated ideally for a sunset drink.

3. Indulge locally produced handicrafts

The Island has many artists and craftsmen, some work with new design and materials, others specialize in old-fashioned ways of creating handicrafts. Jewellery with Gotlandic design, hand-blown glass, wool products and truffle oil, just to mention a few.





Top 3 things to do in Gotland

1. Beaches

Gotland has some of northern Europe best beaches. Tofta, south of Visby and Sudersand on Fårö are long, beautiful sandy beaches. In the summertime both have a lot of holiday makers that love to spend their days by the waterside. Gotland is renowned for having a lot of beaches and even in the high season it's possible to find a small lonely reclusive beach. Some have soft sand, others are better suited for walks, surfing and kitesurfing.



2. Lime stone-fields

The natural phenomena of lime stone sea stacks are one of Gotland most popular sights to visit. They are spread out from the very south of Hoburgen until the very north of Fårö. Some stand alone, others in plentiful groups. The largest sea stacks can be found at Digerhuvund on Fårö but the smaller areas are well worth a visit too. Most of the sea stacks on the western side of Gotland are popular places for sunset-pick nicks.

3. Outdoor activities

The warm climate, the open nature makes Gotland ideal for outdoor activities. Many outdoor activities are best practiced from May to September but depending upon one's interest the time and place can change.

• Activities on sea – swimming, surfing, kitesurfing, SUP and kayak are popular around the coast with many providers offering rentals and guided tours.

 Golfers can experience Kronholmen, one of Sweden's best golf clubs with stunning views. In addition to Kronholmen, there are five other golf clubs on the island.

• Yoga enthusiasts can find outdoor classes in Visby as well as in the countryside. Many places offer retreats of various kinds, often with meals and accommodation included in the price.

• Hikers, bikers and runners. All over Gotland there are trails suitable for different kind of outdoor activities. You can participate on your own or take part in one of the many races that are held on Gotland.

Practical information

Although they speak Swedish on Gotland the Gotlandic people have a strong and charming dialect called "Gotländska". It's strongly connected to Icelandic and other old forms of old Nordic languages.

All over the Island there's free wi-fi at hotels, restaurants and cafés. The easiest way to pay is with credit cards but a lot of places still take cash and some also accept the Swedish pay method called Swish.

The time zone is the same as in the Swedish mainland, but the sunrises and sunsets are often regarded a bit better compared to the rest of the country. In Sweden there's an annually contest regarding what city/place has the most hours of sun every summer. Visby/Gotland has been in the top results for many, many years.

No matter what reason guests have when they first visit Gotland – they will always find new reasons to come back.

PERSONNUMMER



Personnummer

Personal identity numbers, or the personnummer, are an important part of daily life in Sweden. To have any kind of official existence in Sweden everyone has to possess an ID number made of 10 digits, and containing within those digits your date of birth, a birth number which identifies your sex, and a control number which is calculated via a method known as the modulus-10-method.

Unfortunately, as foreign diplomats are not registered in the Swedish population records they are not assigned a typical personnummer, but rather one where the last 4 digits, the control number and birth number, are four zeros. This identifies them as diplomats and not residents.

Equally unfortunately, these quirky personnummers are not recognized by the central Swedish register and consequently cause diplomats many problems as Swedish computers do not accept the four zeros, making it difficult when trying to deal with banks, insurance companies, telephone companies, doctors, dentists, car hire firms etc.

To overcome this problem, there is a uniform identification number called co-ordination number. The purpose of co-ordination numbers is for the authorities and other areas of activity to have a common identification number for persons who are not registered in the Swedish population records. The Tax Office can allocate a co-ordination number on the request of an authority. If the person is later registered in the Swedish population records, the co-ordination number is replaced by a personal identity number – a personnummer.

In the meantime we suggest you simply keep smiling as you endeavour to explain the four zeros problem once again...
